At Indian Hills Animal Clinics we understand that every pet is unique. Factors, such as age, breed, and what your kitten is exposed to, carry certain risks and health needs. This brochure is intended to give you an overview of our recommendations. However, based on your kitten's individual needs and risks, our doctors will determine what is needed for your pet's optimum health.

Fleas

Fleas are a very common problem in cats that spend any time outdoors or live with a dog or another cat that spends time outdoors. Fleas also act as vectors (carriers) of tapeworms, an intestinal parasite. Flea control is best achieved by having a thorough understanding of the flea life cycle and formulating a plan to disrupt it. Flea control and prevention must address both the environment (house and yard), where the egg, larvae, and pupa live, and all the pets in the household, where the adult fleas are. Heartworms



Heartworm disease is a serious and potentially fatal disease in cats. While it has traditionally been thought of as a "dog only" problem, heartworms are being diagnosed with increasing frequency in cats. Heartworm disease is very preventable. Revolution

Revolution is the first-ever FDA-approved, topically applied medication for cats that:

- Kills adult fleas (*Ctenocephalides felis*) and prevents flea eggs from hatching.
- Prevents heartworm disease caused by *Dirofilaria immitis*.
- Treats and controls ear mites (*Otodectes cynotis*).
- Treats and controls roundworms (*Toxocara cati*) and hookworms (*Ancylostoma tubaeforme*).

Feline Leukemia (FeLV) / FIV (Feline AIDS) Test: These two deadly diseases can be transmitted by other cats and from the mother, via the uterus and nursing. We highly recommend all cats and kittens be tested negative for these diseases prior to starting vaccines.	\$49.50			
Fecal Exam: This examination consists of two tests that check for 7 different intestinal parasites. Kittens are checked twice during their first year. Some of these parasites can be a risk to you and your family.	\$21.00			\$21.00
